The region performed well across all the criteria analysed, including education, jobs, income, safety, health, environment, civic engagement and accessibility to services, and emerged with a score of 7.82 out of 10 putting it ahead of the other regions in France.

Second place went to Limousin which scored highly in employment and civic

engagement and had a total score of 7.77, while Pays de la Loire came third with a stable score of 7.71. Corsica brings up the rear with a score of 5.66, despite scoring well in the category of environment
